Print Resources

Author Last , First Name. Title. Place Published: Publisher, Copyright date.

One author:

Appelt, Kathi. Poems from Homeroom; a Writer's Place to Start.
New York: Henry Holt and Company, 2002.

George, Kristine. Swimming Upstream; Middle School Poems.
New York: Clarion Books, 2002.

More than one author:

Hyde, Margaret O. and Elizabeth H. Forsyth. Vaccinations; From Smallpox to Cancer. New York: Franklin Watts, 2000.

By Editor or Selector:

Paulsen, Gary, ed. Shelf Life; Stories By the Book. New York: Simon and Schuster Books for Young Readers.

Periodicals

Last Name, First Name. "Article Title." Magazine Title Date: Pages.
(If the article came from an online database, include that information after the citation.) eg. (EBSCO) or (Infotrac)

Article from a Magazine:

Article from a Newspaper:

Dewey, Rachel E. "More Local Students Are Making the Grade in Math."
Daily Messenger 24 October 2003: B1+.

Unsigned Article (no identified author):

"Martin Luther King Jr." Scholastic Action 12 January 2004: 4-5. (Infotrac)

Title. Publisher, Copyright Date.
The Smoke Around You. American Cancer Society, 1987.

Reference Books

"Article Title." Reference Book or Encyclopedia Title, Vol #. Date ed.

Unsigned Article: "Otters." Encyclopedia of Mammals, Volume 11. 1994 ed.
Include the author's name, if listed:

Signed Article: Reddy, William M. "Paris." World Book, Volume 15. 2001 ed.
